
Dear Mrs. Mills,

CHAPTER 12

(H. B. 47)

AN ACT relating to the employment and compensation of county road employes, amending Section 179.110 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

Section 179.110 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes is amended to read as follows:

The fiscal court shall employ necessary employes and agents for the construction and maintenance of county roads and bridges, and may summarily discharge them at pleasure. The employes shall perform service upon the county roads of the county according to the direction prescribed by the fiscal court or the county judge. The employes may receive such compensation per day as may be allowed by the fiscal court.

CHAPTER 13

(H. B. 54)

AN ACT relating to the classification of cities, amending Section 81.010 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, and declaring an emergency to exist.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

Section 81.010 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes is amended so as to classify the City of Erlanger, in Kenton

County, and the City of Jenkins, in Letcher County, each as a fourth-class city; so as to classify the City of Russell Springs, in Russell County, as a fifth-class city; and so as to classify the City of Liberty, in Casey County, as a fifth-class city, so that said Section 81.010, as so amended, will read as follows:

(6) All other incorporated cities belong to the sixth class.

Whereas, this re-classification is necessary in order for certain cities of this Commonwealth to qualify for and receive financial aid from the Federal Government vitally needed for the construction of hospitals, and

Whereas, the immediate construction of such hospital facilities is essential to the public health and welfare in such areas;

An emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Act shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Governor.

CHAPTER 14

(H. B. 67)

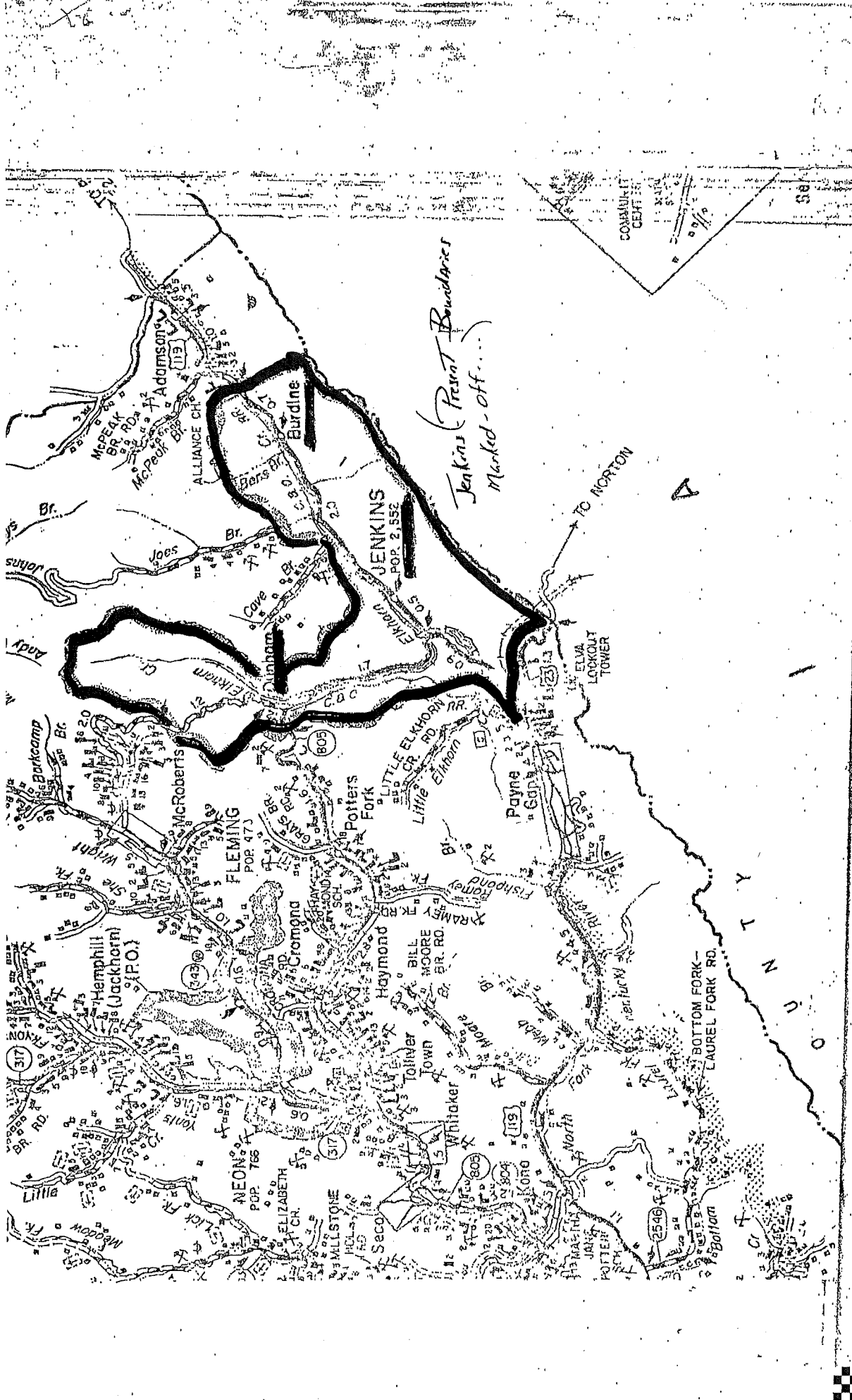
AN ACT relating to Assistant Attorneys-General; appointment; duties; qualifications and salaries; making an appropriation for the payment of salaries of Assistant Attorneys-General and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

SECTION 1. 15.100 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes is amended as to read as follows:

(1) In addition to the Assistant Attorneys-General provided for in KRS 15.110 to 15.160, the Attorney-General may appoint six Assistant Attorneys-General who shall serve for the term for which he is elected, unless sooner removed by him.

(2) They shall perform such duties as are assigned them by the Attorney-General in furtherance of the discharge of his duties. The first Assistant Attorney-General shall, in the
