**RESOLUTION NO. 04- 007**

**A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE INITIATION OF HAVING THE CITY RE-CLASSIFIED AS A FOURTH CLASS CITY.**

*WHEREAS*, the City of Union is currently classified as a Fifth Class City;

*WHEREAS*, the population of the City of Union in 2000 according to the United States Census was 2893 persons;

*WHEREAS*, the Boone County Planning Commission has estimated that the population of the City of Union in 2002 was 3048 persons;

*WHEREAS*, that the Old Section 156 of the Kentucky Constitution requires a City of the Fourth Class a population between 3,000 and 8000 persons;

*WHEREAS*, KRS 81.032 requires the City of Union through its City Commission to provide the general assembly by certified resolution certain population data;

*WHEREAS*, the re-classification procedure is initiated when a legislator files a bill seeking formal re-classification of the City;

*WHEREAS*, the Honorable Paul Marcotte is the representative from the District which includes the City of Union;

*WHEREAS*, the Mayor of the City of Union has made a recommendation to have the City of Union re-classified as a Fourth Class City and that recommendation has been received and approved by the City Commission;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF UNION AS FOLLOWS:**

**SECTION I**

That Mayor Donald Kirby is hereby directed to request that the Honorable Paul Marcotte file a bill with the General Assembly which would re-classify the City of Union from a Fifth Class City to a Fourth Class City.

**SECTION II**

That this Resolution shall hereby act as the City of Union's certification that the population of the City of Union exceeds 3,000 persons.

# BOONE COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION BUDGET JUSTIFICATION

FY 2004-2005

## I. POPULATION TRENDS

In order to understand the work activities and financial contribution requests of the Boone County Planning Commission, it is important to recognize the continued population growth trends of the Boone County. Each legislative unit continues to experience additional population growth, despite a downturn in the local economy. The residential population figures mentioned below include totals for the Cities of Florence, Walton and Union, the unincorporated area and a total for all of Boone County. From 1990-2000, the population of Boone County has increased by 49.2%, the largest increase in the Cincinnati metropolitan region. Boone County continues to be the fastest growing county in the Cincinnati MSA and the second fastest growing county in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In 2001, Boone County was ranked 85th in the nation in terms of percentage population increase. In 2003, Boone County was ranked 96 out of 100 of the fastest growing counties in the United States. **Table 1** illustrates the changes in population from 1940-2003 for Boone County, while **Table 2** indicates the increases in population for the three cities and the unincorporated area since 1980. The 2003 population figure is an estimate and is based upon building activity since the completion of the 2000 Census.
